"It's amazing ... a 40-pound boat for \$125, how much joy and experience it can bring to you," Vander Haagen said.

"The joy is accomplishing getting from point A to point B safely. This is a very small boat, and I used to go to the east coast of Puerto Rico from some këys, which is open water," Vander Haagen said. "And when I reached my destination, which was maybe 3 or 5 miles away, people would see me and ask if I came all the way here in that little thing.

"Let me tell you, most of the time, it was re-

ally scary," says Vander Haagen, general manager of the 25,000-square-foot West Marine store in the Clear Lake area.

"Your mind starts playing tricks on you," he said, "It showed me more respect for the water and more respect for the weather."

Since then, Vander Haagen has kayaked in Monterey Bay, sailed all around the Gulf Coast and in most Texas lakes, and powerboated and fished in Tampa Bay and throughout the Caribbean. He has owned three sailboats, including two catamarans and four powerboats.

He also scuba-dives and snorkels, but he hasn't surfed - yet.
